City considers Angelo Drive annexation

Annexation of 1812 Angelo Drive from Los Angeles to Beverly Hills was considered by the City Council at its study session meeting Tuesday.

"My concerns are the integrity of the city boundaries," Councilmember John Mirisch said. "There are a lot of people close to the city that would like to be part of Beverly Hills."

In a letter to the city from Dr. and Mrs. Harold Karpman's lawyer, Mitchell J. Dawson, a former planning commissioner, it said their reasoning was simple: safety.

The letter said the Karpmans' security camera had been stolen from outside their home. When they called the Los Angeles police, LAPD told them to call the Beverly Hills police because they did not live in L.A. When Mrs. Karpman called Beverly Hills police, she was told that she did not live in Beverly Hills and it was indeed a matter for LAPD.

Mirisch said this is not a unique case and that it is Los Angeles' responsibility to provide a safe, secure environment for its residents.

"We can and should work with L.A. to make sure the applicant's security issues are addressed," Mirisch said. "But the solution is not to annex them."

Dawson did not return calls by press time.

According to a staff report from the City of Beverly Hills, the estimated costs associated with the annexation for the Karpman's is \$127,000. However, annexing their home into Beverly Hills would increase its value significantly.

"I don't see any harm to the city on a financial basis," Councilmember Willie Brien said. "If the city is not bearing any of the costs."

The Council asked for more information on the case before they move forward with any decision making.

The most recent annexation request considered in Beverly Hills was for 1132 Daniels Drive in 2007. However, because of associated costs the agreement was never finalized.

A large portion of Hillgreen Drive (Pictured below) was annexed in the late 1990s, which was discussed in the Weekly's story "Hillgreen owners seeing red" (Issue #340).



Goldberg suggests proposed budget cuts

At a Board of Education study session Tuesday, Board of Education member Brian Goldberg suggested thinning out district administrator positions as a form of budget cuts.

"It went over like a lead brick," Goldberg said.

Goldberg suggested cutting positions such as director of business services and director of food services.

"In this economic climate all of us are doing more work with less staff," Goldberg said.

Board Vice President Myra Lurie said these positions are essential to the district.

"I appreciate Dr. Goldberg's careful assessment of the budget and I thought some of his suggestions were good," Lurie said. "I certainly respect his opinion, but I don't share it."

Another suggestion made was cutting half of the substitute teacher reserve fund, which would shave off about \$230,000 from the budget.

"We talk about having a world class education," Goldberg said. "That means prioritizing our budget."

Despite a limited response to his suggestions, Goldberg said he would be making a motion of his proposals at the board

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meeting Tuesday, June 23.

Five burglars arrested in five hours

Beverly Hills police responded to a report of vehicular burglary at Camden Drive and Charleville Boulevard Sunday at midnight.

The investigating officer was notified of three suspects, Braxton Wynton, 19, Tybald Jourdan, 19, and a 17-year-old female hiding in nearby bushes. All three were taken into custody and charged with auto burglary.

Officers received a report of vandalism at 4:55 a.m. to a vehicle in the 400 block of North Oakhurst Drive. Officers arrived on the scene and saw a known burglary suspect. They conducted a felony traffic stop at North Santa Monica and Huntley in West Hollywood. Donald Beene, 33, and Miriam Ortiz, 35, were arrested for

burglary.

It was later discovered the suspects committed five burglaries to vehicles in Beverly Hills prior to their arrest and could be responsible for additional crimes. Beene had a \$250,000 warrant out for his arrest.

"Teamwork and coordination led to outstanding police work, but a quick response time just about eliminated their chance of escape," Lt. Tony Lee said.

Lee said these arrests will have a major impact in vehicle burglaries.

City makes \$18.7 million in budget cuts

More than 75 percent of the City's revenue comes from retail, hotels and business taxes. Because of the economic downturn, however, the City has cut its 2009/2010 annual budget to \$399 million.

"The City Council has approved a conservative budget that reflects the economic slowdown and the resulting revenue losses, while upholding critical programs and services which the community values," chief financial officer Scott Miller said.

While the cuts were felt across the City, police and fire department services were left alone.

Programs and services that were impacted include: eliminating the Youth

in Government program, closing the library early three nights a week: at 8 p.m. Tuesdays and Wednesdays and 6 p.m. Thursdays, and reducing landscaping and tree pruning in city parks and green spaces.

These Cuts Will Hurt

But City does have a budget

The message is clear: Don't mess with our senior citizens; at least not those that exercise.

Every weekday some 15 of our "active adults" take part in an exercise class at Roxbury Park. Last week they discovered that their class was going to be cut from five to two classes per week, all part of the city's across the boards reduction in services.

So, the class did what any group of militants would do: they marched on city hall. At Tuesday's study session they not only protested the loss of their class, they made a collective offer even the council could not refuse. They offered to pay for the costs. How much was involved? Fifteen dollars per day for a fitness instructor!

The program will be spared the municipal ax, but it was marvelous to watch the orderly, careful presentation made by the class users at the council meeting. Some other impacted programs could have learned from their use of the democratic process.

Congratulations to **Mildred Heller**, president of the Active Adult (Seniors) Club and **David Brennan, Kathryn Marinakos, Leona Gerichter, Linda Roberts** (yes our activist Linda who proudly revealed her age qualifying her as a senior), **R.H. Wyshak** and **Susan Alexman**, speaking for the Jewish Family Services.

As for the balance of the wrenching cuts the city has had to make, the good news is that the process did end Tuesday night, we do have a budget, but the impacts on the city will be enormous.

Despite assurances in all their campaign speeches in the last election and even from incumbents not running for reelection that there would be no cuts in police, fire and schools, the only one that could not be touched was the Joint Powers Agreement with the BHUSD.

Every single department of the city lost considerable funding. The most significant were in the city manager's office. Facing a short fall of \$18.3 million and unwilling to make serious raids on the reserves, the final budget was just under \$400 million, down almost 20 percent from last year.

The budget cuts will be felt in many areas of community services. Police and Fire will together lose about \$4 million but this is not in emergency response services.

Some 46 jobs will be eliminated; however many of these are unfilled positions. The city has had an informal job freeze for some months.

Other services that will feel the municipal ax:

- The city library will close early three nights per week.
- Reduction in tree pruning and landscap-

ing.

- Programs and classes at all city parks
- Elimination of the Youth in Government program.
- Members of Team Beverly Hills will pay a fee for membership
- Rotating two school assigned police officers for elementary schools with one to remain at the high school.
- Reductions in tourist programs, holiday decorations and other supporting funds for civic groups.
- And not filling jobs in planning and building which will, the city admits, mean increasing customer waiting time.

Although the council paid tribute to city staff for biting the bullet in every city department and making the painful cuts needed, we should also thank the city council itself for the tedious, lengthy and often politically difficult calls they had to make. This council probably set a record for numbers of meetings ever held on adopting a budget. (Led by Councilmember **Barry Brucker**, each member thanked staff and department heads for their efforts.)

Aside from the council, the real grunt work was done by City Manager **Rod Wood** and his staff. **Dr. Scott Miller**, the city's chief financial officer, deserves special mention for both his professionalism and calm approach to the contentious challenges the city faced.

Mayor **Nancy Krasne**, although very involved in the budget review meetings, was not at Tuesday's budget vote, nursing a throat infection. But she did call me to explain her reasons for questioning the council's decision to retain Wood as a consultant past the time his contract expires. Mostly, her reasons were monetary, but more on this later.

The Council did vote unanimously to keep City Manager Wood on the job during the search for a replacement. A contract with a head hunter will soon or has been adopted. In any case, it would have been disastrous to try to bring in a new city manager before the new budget was approved.

A lot of flack hit the city over a possible loss of the CPR program, most of it not warranted and not real. There was never a chance the program would be abandoned. What was at issue was funding for a highly skilled program coordinator. However, with or without the paid staff person, the city's fire department would have continued providing CPR training.

In a compromise that may not please everyone, the city will "give" the

Friends of CPR \$50,000 for the next fiscal year to pay for the staff person. They probably will have to step up their own fund rais-

ing from private donors, class participants and events.

At almost the last minute some usually sacred cows also felt the budget crisis: Holiday decorations and the Rodeo Drive Committee.

While I may not always agree with newly elected Councilmember **John Mirisch**, he did display considerable compassion and concern about grant allocations. Mirisch said he could not support the same level of spending for holiday decorations and for tourism while approving cuts in city services for the most needy in our community.

More important than whether he was right or wrong, was his highly mature and professional approach during the discussions even though he was the lone vote against some fund requests. He did manage to gain support for cuts in holiday decoration costs and some tourist programs, but not sufficient to gain his vote. Aside from those items, he voted with a unanimous council to adopt the budget and did give recognition to staff and the city manager for their leadership.

One alternative might be to ask the major department stores on Wilshire to contribute to the holiday decoration costs. What should not happen is the loss of this program on South Beverly Drive. Before the current Chamber of Commerce management team took over, South Beverly had been the neglected city orphan with no promotional holiday attention.

No question, the Walk of Style event sponsored by the Rodeo Drive Association, with financial support from the city, brings us loads of media attention. But the Association too needs to dip into its own coffers and find more financial support from Rodeo Drive retailers this year.

Interestingly, only the Rodeo Drive Association had representatives at the council study session to defend their program. Unfortunately, the major stores on Wilshire are not as involved in the Chamber of Commerce as they had been in recent years.

The Walk of Style is a valuable city program; however what annual event generates the most publicity for the city? The Golden Globes at the Beverly Hilton sans any city funding.

Speaking of events, the city gave tentative approval to including Beverly Hills in the route for the annual Los Angeles Marathon, as did West Hollywood. The "run" had the support of city staff, including the police department and will, according to the owners of the race, bring tourists to our hotels and restaurants.

Probably worth a one year try, but I have serious reservations on how much this will disrupt movement within the city. We can study both financial benefits and impacts carefully before we rush to agree for a second run.

Another group of very angry residents appeared at the council Tuesday to protest construction of mammoth new homes in the hillside areas. They claim these houses not only block their views, but were constructed

in violation of city codes. The council asked staff to come back with a report on whether there was proper city review of the construction. Long time hillside resident and activist **Mary Levin Cutler** helped lead the charge.

In a move to block immediate conversion of the under construction William Morris building on North Beverly Drive to common use (commercial condos) the council, under the urging of Councilmember Brucker adopted an immediate freeze on the scheme.

This project is a potential debacle. The city granted exceptions to the codes because they were assured this was the only way to keep the famed talent agency in the city, but without sufficient protection to assure that would happen. Now Morris has been sold and tenancy is very doubtful. The council did act quickly and wisely to prevent immediate conversion.

As for business interests complaining about cuts in city funding for events, where were they when the voters were conned into voting against Measure P? True, the construction of the tax ballot issue was not artfully handled, but the increases in taxes were minimal, would have had absolutely no effect on most businesses and less on consumers. Akin to the old saw of the person who pleaded for mercy when charged with the murder of his parents because he was now an orphan.

Actually, the Chamber and the Rodeo Drive committee could have taken a page from the seniors who took their cause to the council forcefully and with skill.

Among those honored last week by the Chamber were city icon **Fred Hayman** and Theatre 40. Hayman received a life time achievement award and the professional theatre group that presents those outstanding productions at the Reuben Cordova Theatre at the high school are both city treasures.

A special nod to **David Hunt Stafford**, the managing director of Theatre 40 and the support groups president, **Jim Jahant**, manager of our Brooks Brother's store on Rodeo and newly elected president of the Chamber of Commerce. And how can you mention Theatre 40 without a special thanks to their big booster, **Lya Cordova-Latta**.

As for Hayman, our style guru, a biography of his incredible career is being written. Also, the reproduction of his famed store on Rodeo now in front of the Hayman building on North Canon has become a tourist attraction itself. I have seen countless visitors with cameras posing with the art work.

Finally, a word about the other members of the council. **Dr. Willie Brien** was his usual organized and thoughtful public servant during the budget debates and vice mayor **Jimmy Delshad** did great work, in the absence of Mayor Krasne, in presiding over the council as it brought the budget discussions to a close. We wish Nancy a speedy recovery.

BHHS To Host Summer Football Tournament Saturday

Norman girls' basketball team wins three of four games in tournament

The Beverly High football team is scheduled to face outside competition for the first time in 2009 Saturday when it plays host to the Best in the West Tournament of seven-on-seven touch football games played in T-shirts and shorts at Nickoll Field.

The Normans are set to face Palos Verdes Chadwick at 8:30 a.m., San Fernando at 10:30 a.m. and Montebello Schurr at 11:10 a.m. in pool play games.

The single-elimination portion of the tournament will follow pool play, with the championship game scheduled for approximately 6 p.m.

As usual, the tournament will help show "how far along we are after spring football" and "the competitive spirit of these kids, especially for the incoming varsity players," Beverly Hills coach Carter Paysinger said.

During spring practice, "we think we did well," but until "you compete against other people, it's hard to know if you were successful or not," Paysinger said.

Josh Newman has been named as starting quarterback, succeeding the graduating Dex Lucci, Paysinger said.

Girls' Basketball

Beverly Hills won all three of its games in the Beverly Hills Regional of the Southern

California Interscholastic Basketball Association Classic June 5-6 at the Swim-Gym, then lost to La Puente Bishop Amat, 52-51, June 7 in a tournament semifinal at Arroyo High School in El Monte.

The Normans, playing with just six players, trailed the Lancers 27-11 midway through the first half, then rallied to take small leads several times in the second half.

Beverly Hills missed five layups in the final 30 seconds, including two in the final three seconds, according to assistant coach Charles Solomon, who guided the team during the absence of John Braddell, who had a football commitment.

Solomon called the loss "very disappointing, because I thought we were the better team."

"Our defensive intensity was terrible," Solomon said. "We didn't have a lot of energy. The girls just didn't play as hard on the road than at home."

The Normans played "very solid" in the tournament's four games, Solomon said.

Chelsea Austin, who will replace the graduating Javonna Young as the starting center, was "the biggest surprise" for Beverly Hills in the tournament, averaging about 12 points per game, Solomon said.

"She gives us a third weapon on the floor. We're very hard to guard when all three in the game," Solomon said, referring to Miranda Abdul-Mansour, Austin and Morgan Mason.

The Normans defeated Inglewood, 43-32, in the regional final June 6,

"We again started slow and finally took the lead right before [halftime], and then kind of wore them down in the second half," Solomon said.

The Sentinels, the Southern Section

Division III-A runner-up, played without standout guard Hazel Ramirez, Solomon said.

Beverly Hills defeated Long Beach Millikan, 47-36, in a championship semifinal June 6, after trailing 14-4 and 24-21 at halftime.

"I thought we were the much better team, but we just started very slow," Solomon said.

The Normans began the tournament June 5 61-18 rout of Palos Verdes, which reached the second round of the Division III-A playoffs.

"I thought we were very balanced and unselfish," Solomon said. "[Palos Verdes] was a very good team, but everything we did was right and everything they did was wrong."

What's Next?

The Normans are scheduled to begin play in the play in the Desert Resorts Boys and Girls Summer Basketball Classic Friday at 7 p.m. against San Diego Mission Bay at Marywood-Palm Valley High School in Rancho Mirage.

The three-day tournament is set to conclude Sunday.

Boys' Basketball

Beverly Hills is scheduled to begin play in the Redondo Union Tuesday Varsity Summer League Tuesday against Los Angeles Cathedral at 4:35 p.m. at Redondo Union High School.

Normans coach Derek Boldon said the goal for the summer is "to get a lot of improvement" offensively and defensively and "keep them in the weight room all summer."

The players "have to get a lot stronger" to be able to have "a more physical presence on the court," Boldon said.

Beverly Hills was 4-22, including a 0-10 record in Ocean League play, last season, Boldon's first as its coach.

Star singled in the first and third innings, while Harding singled in the first and sixth.

Culver City scored twice in the first, five times in the second, and once in both the third and fifth.

Emily Rosen (8-11) pitched a complete game for the Normans, allowing nine runs (four earned), 12 hits, striking out three and not walking a batter in six innings.

Senior Rebecca Gold singled twice and drove in a run as the Normans concluded their season with a loss in an Ocean League game at Beverly Hills May 14.

Gold singled in Harding, who had doubled with two outs in the fifth.

Beverly Hills (10-13, 4-6 in league play) scored its other run in the sixth, as Solange Levy singled in Annie Math, who had led off with a single.

The Cougars scored all their runs in the fifth. Yasmin Antonio singled in Winnie Reece, who walked, and Cynthia Quiroz, who doubled. The next batter, Delilah O'Neill, doubled in Jackie Delgado and Antonio.

Rosen (8-12) pitched a complete game, allowing seven hits, four runs (all earned), walked three and did not strike out a batter in seven innings.

The Normans were out-hit, 7-6. Tamar Rotstein had their other hit, a single leading off the third.

Beverly Hills finished fourth in the six-team league, failing to qualify for the playoffs because of a lack of a "consistent defense" and "our hitting kind of let us down," coach Len Mitchell said.

Mitchell said the team will concentrate on hitting next season.



The City Council of the City of Beverly Hills does resolve as follows:

Recently, the Governor has declared a drought in the State of California and the Metropolitan Water District's announcement of a regional shortage level 2 (equal to ten percent) will compel the water wholesaler to limit the amount of purchasable water to its member agencies. In light of this water emergency and for the reasons set forth in the agenda report presented to the City Council on May 13, 2009, the City Manager has determined that a ten percent (10%) reduction in potable water use is required and that water conservation Stage "B" be declared and implemented by the City Council. Beverly Hills Municipal Code Section 94301 provides that the City Manager or his designee is authorized to implement certain water conservation measures after holding a public hearing before the City Council.

Section 2. On May 13, 2009, the City Council held a duly noticed public hearing to consider the recommendations of the Environmental Utilities Manager to implement

water conservation Stage "B." After receiving oral and written testimony, including the agenda report, the City Council hereby determines as follows:

(a) Water Conservation Stage "B" is hereby declared throughout the City of Beverly Hills and the City Council hereby directs that the Environmental Utilities Manager implement Water Conservation Stage "B" as set forth herein.

(b) The Environmental Utilities Manager and/or appropriate City Staff shall hereby communicate to residents, visitors and businesses the following mandatory water conservation measures for implementation: (i) restaurants shall serve water upon request only; (ii) all public restrooms in the city and private bathrooms in hotels shall notify patrons and employees of water conservation goals; (iii) plumbing and irrigation leaks shall be repaired within seven days notification to the property owner by the City; and (iv) water usage shall be reduced to ninety percent (90%) of the baseline year amount as determined by the City Manager; and the watering of lawns and other landscape shall occur in accordance to a watering schedule promulgated by the Environmental Utilities Manager. In addition to these elements, the City Council hereby authorizes the City Manager or his designee to implement other mandatory water conservation elements as determined necessary by the City Manager in order to achieve a ten percent (10%) reduction in potable water use.

(c) A water penalty surcharge of up to two (2) times the basic water rate shall be charged for water usage in excess of ninety percent (90%) of the baseline year amount as determined by the City Manager.

(d) Violation by any person of the stage "B" mandatory requirements described in subsection (b) shall constitute an infraction and, upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00). The violation of each element described in subsection (b), and each separate violation thereof, shall be deemed a separate offense, and shall be punished accordingly.

Section 3. In accordance with Beverly Hills Municipal Code Section 94303.B, the City Council her by directs the City Clerk to publish this Resolution at least once in a newspaper of general circulation within the city and to post this Resolution in at least three (3) public places and continue to post this Resolution until such time as the restrictions set forth herein are repealed by resolution of the City Council.

Section 4. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this resolution and shall cause this resolution and his certification to be entered in the Book of Resolutions of the Council of the City.
